



To an Englishman 'Carnival' conjures up a picture of gaily decorated publicity floats, candyfloss, hoopla, mayoral openings, demure carnival queens, fireworks and loud speakers trumpeting the top ten.Carnivals invariably take place in July and August during the summer holiday period. Given good organisation and a bright sunny day, much money will be raised for the local good causes and the children will go happy and sticky to bed.

In continental Furope, things are very different. The Italians claim to have invented Carnival the name being derived from the latin'Carne vale! meaning "farewell to the flesh". Bayaria and the Rhineland the festivities become 'Fasching' from the word "fastnacht" meaning the 'Night of Fasting'. which is a last fling before the austerities of Lent. It is indeed a very long night, and if full support is given to the occasion real stamina is needed, for the official start is on November 11th, although the season does not get under way until after Christmas and ends on Shrove Tuesday. The last week sees the tempestuous climax. In Vienna 'Fasching' culminates in the superb, formal Operabal which takes place in the majestic operahouse. largely rebuilt since the war. The splendour of this occasion must closely rival the glitter and glamour of the great days of Vienna under the Hapsburgs. On

this night members of the important Viennese families, however strained their present circumstances may be, spare no expense to attend, the tickets alone cost about £10 each, and for many it is the one day in the year when they recapture some of their former grandeur.

Soon after the end of the Russian Occupation I was in Vienna during the last week of Fasching. My host met me at the airport, installed me in my hotel and asked me to excuse him as he had to change into his costume for the Hunter's Ball, and although he had been to two and sometimes three parties each night for the past week and had not seen his bed before four or five o'clock in the mornings, he shewed no visible signs of fatigue. It is not in the least unusual to find people in fancy dress at this time of the year in the city. If it's the morning, they are returning from a party that went on late, or in the afternoon, they are going to one that is starting early.

The day after my arrival, having completed a full business schedule my host and I prepared for our first evening engagement together, and our work completed we there upon changed into our evening clothes at his office and proceeded direct to the City Hall for the Radio and Television Ball. Every business, trade and cultural group gives




a Ball during Fasching and the city authorities help by placing themselves entirely in the hands of the revellers.

The Ball was formally opened by the Master of Ceremonies who bore a strong resemblance to Erich von Stroheim, a formidable figure as he bowed to the mayor and asked permission for the Ball to begin, he had, I was told, taught all the sons and daughters of the leading families to dance. As the orchestra struck up the 'Blue Danube', fifty couples moved into the dance with perfect precision; the men immaculate in full evening dress, the girls in white ball gowns. Not a fault could be seen, but one had the impression that had there been one it would have been spotted by the Master of Ceremonies and the culprit severely reprimanded on the following

After a very short visit to this ball we were whisked off for a quick change into fancy dress for the Artists Ball which took place in a very congested cellar. The motif that year was a 'Coiled spring' and it was quite astonishing what some of the artists had managed to do with such a simple theme. The springs and the plentiful supply of 'Sekt' (a sparkling Austrian white wine) soon ensured that everyone knew everyone else, even if. as in my case, one's German was not highly fluent. The band played Viennese waltzs unceasingly and the whole affair was riotous and boisterously gay.

Nonetheless, as I crept back to my hotel in dawn's early light I had the feeling that I preferred the Anglo-Saxon version of 'Carnival'.



Here's two handy Hints:



PARISH COUNCIL MEETINGS

JANUARY 19th.......Main item of discussion was the Rate for the current year-after financial debate under various headings it was decided to precept for a 5d rate. This was quite notable news for it represents a DROP in the rates of 1d, and this at a time when the rates are creeping upwards.

FEBRUARY 16th..... During the time prior to the Parish Council meeting allotted to the electorate a member of the public -Mr. King of Wooburn Townraised the question of the preservation of trees in the Parish. One member of the council thanked Mr. King for raising the question and it was indicated that trees on Council property would be preserved and only cut down where found to be dangerous.

The main item discussed at the Parish Council meeting was the question of the purchase of the freehold of Wooburn Green together with the Lordship of the Manor. The chairman Mr. F. R. Dandridge expressed the view that the title Lord of the Manor was an ancient one and very much a part of our heritage which he felt ought to be retained within our Parish and invited the council to discuss the matter very fully. It was ultimately decided that negotiations should continue as it was felt desirable that both the freehold of the Green and the Lordship of the Manor be acquired by the Parish Council.

MARCH 9th..... The first part of the meeting was the Statutary Parish Meeting


for 1965 during which members of the Parish can participate. Some interesting facts were given by the chairman:
Total rateable value of the Parish was now approximately £394,000. The product of a 1d rate is now £1,762.

Mrs. M.G. Woollertonspoke of the necessity for a PEDES TRIAN CROSSING in the village and indicated that despite this being refused recently she, as a Rural District Councillor intended writing to our Member of Parliament urging him to take this matter further.

Mrs. Woollerton asked for support from the Parish Council and it was unantmously agreed that the council would also write to Mr. John Hall M. P.

The council also discussed the Freehold of Wooburn Green and the Lordship of the Manor. The Clerk advised the council that the Parish Council solicitors had received correspondence from the Trustees indicating that they would not dispose of the Freehold and Lordship for less than £500. The Chairman indicated that the Farish Council may acquire by Prescription as far as the Freehold of Wooburn Green was concerned and the council ordered the Clerk to write to the council's solicitors so that this Information be forwarded to the trustees. As faras the Lordship of the Manor was concerned as the titleship is dormant in this case it may well be within the jurisdiction of the Master of the Rolls and the Clerk was instructed to write enquiring whether the Trustees can in fact dispose of the title to a third party.


THE WOOBURN, BOURNE END & DISTRICT COUNCIL OF CHURCHES


